A Series of Fortunate Events

How a Single Positive Action Opened Many New Doors

New PM Network columnist Rania Al-Maghraby, PMP, came to PMI's attention after she sent in this short article about how a small positive action led to a series of achievements:

ne morning while I was checking my e-mail, I found a message from PMI asking me to participate in a survey. Sometimes when e-mails like these are sent, they are ignored, since the receiver is not expecting anything in return. However, to be positive, you value participation in such surveys, and you will view it somehow as a duty, and that's what I did. I simply went through the survey and pressed "Submit." I wasn't expecting anything in return, but just after submission, the series of achievements began!

I didn't use to visit the PMI website frequently, but the survey was designed to redirect to the PMI home page after submission. There on the home page I found "Call for Papers" for the PMI Research Conference. I read it, thought about it, and I made up my mind to share by sending a paper to the conference.

I'm PMP® certified, and Information Technology
Infrastructure Library (ITIL®) Foundation certified as well. I
received these certifications just one month apart, and I
remember that during my preparation for these certifications I was able to draw out some conjunction between the
concepts relating to the two frameworks.

I thought that I might write a paper on this topic, and I gave it the title, A Project Management Perspective on ITIL® V3. I wrote the paper specifically for that conference, and I sent it before the deadline.

While I was gathering information on the topic, however, I searched for as much relevant content as possible, and I came upon the website of the <code>itSMF®</code> International. I mainly wanted to get information on the topic of my paper, but at the website I found something else—the list of national chapters for this organization. Egypt wasn't in the list. I contacted <code>itSMF</code> officers in the United Kingdom. Soon a project to establish this chapter was under way.

Back to the research conference: The reviewers said that the paper wasn't a research paper, but one of them was positive enough to suggest submitting it to a PMI global congress. Another communication channel was opened with the congress organizers, and at the end, I was able to present the paper at PMI Global Congress 2008—EMEA in Malta.

Yet another opportunity occurred as I was viewing the list of congress speakers in order to try to find someone from the Arabic region or from Egypt to get in touch with in advance. There was, and I got in touch, which also opened some project management job opportunities through this person, as well as adding to my professional network.

The bottom line—I didn't expect this series of achievements to follow each other just by my participating in an online survey. If it weren't for that survey, I wouldn't have known about the conference and submitted a paper for it; I wouldn't have reached the *it*SMF website and taken the initiative to establish the chapter in Egypt; and I wouldn't have gotten in touch with the Egyptian colleagues who were sharing in the conference and who opened new opportunities for me. And I wouldn't have been selected as a *PM Network* columnist.

The message is simple and clear: be positive!
